COVID-19 AND LEWINSVILLE UPDATE

At their March 16 meeting, the Session voted to plan for a return to indoor, in-person worship – for a limited number of people with a variety of safety protocols – on **Sunday, May 2, 2021.**

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends at Lewinsville,

Biblical faith speaks in different ways about *fear*.

My favorite understanding of the meaning of Easter is that “Jesus Christ has overcome sin and death, and therefore, *we do not need to be afraid*, of anyone, or anything, anymore.” Proverbs 9 says that “the *fear of the Lord* is the beginning of wisdom. (Proverbs 9:10).

Jesus said, “Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather *fear him* who can destroy both soul and body in hell” (Matthew 10:28).

1 John 4 teaches that “*there is no fear in love*, but perfect love casts out fear” (1 John 4:18).

Biblical faith speaks to us in different ways about fear, and about *different kinds of fear*. According to biblical faith, there is a fear that leads to anxiety, fretting, and dread terror. But there is also a kind of fear that leads to wisdom (the opposite of which is foolishness) and wise behavior.

The resurrection of Jesus at Easter sets us *free from* the first kind of fear, in order that we may be *free for* the second. We are set free from being scared of other people, of social ostracism, of bullies and those who would intimidate us, in order that we may be free to live in “the fear-of-the-Lord,” which means to live in wisdom, to act in steady, secure ways, to live with neighborly acts of generosity, compassion, mercy, and love.

The proper fear of the Lord has to do with reverence and awe. Just as one would do well to act with a certain reverence around fire, or around deep water, or around a tall mountain. If we act foolishly around these things, we can get hurt. But when we live with a proper respect and appreciation – a proper fear of their power – we can enjoy them in beautiful ways.

In the same way, we live with reverence before God, because God’s power has been shown to us in the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. Reverence towards God always leads us to act with respect and appreciation towards God’s creation.

Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!

This decision assumes that vaccination rates continue to rise, and that virus infection rates in our area continue to decline.

The health and safety of each other remains a top priority for us.

Our plan for returning is to allow up to 30 worshippers in the pews, spaced throughout the sanctuary. Pre-registration will be necessary for each Sunday’s worship; priority on subsequent Sundays will be given to those who have not yet been to indoor worship. Masks will be required, and there will be no congregational singing during the service. Worship leaders will also be masked, except when they are speaking (as we are currently doing with the livestreamed services).

In deciding whether to come to worship or not, worshippers will be encouraged to consider their own vaccination status, as well as any known exposure in recent days to persons with COVID-19.

We expect these protocols will evolve and change as conditions change. We will continue to provide live-streaming of the Sunday services, for multiple reasons, not least of which is that we know that there will be persons who do not yet feel comfortable worshipping in the sanctuary. We also expect that, in the short term, many church programs and meetings will continue to take place over Zoom and other virtual platforms (also due to significant parts of the church building being unavailable due to the renovation).

We believe this is a hopeful step forward for us as a congregation, as we make our way through these challenging times. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to Pastor Scott, Pastor Jen, or any member of the Session.

A TIME OF RENEWAL

Congratulations, Lewinsville Presbyterian Church! Our church was recently recertified as an Earth Care

Congregation (ECC) by the Presbyterian Church (USA), honoring the commitment Lewinsville has made to caring for God's earth. Despite the challenges imposed by COVID-19, we maintained focus on making sustainable choices as individuals and as a congregation. Lewinsville was initially certified as an Earth Care Congregation in 2019, after affirming an Earth Care Pledge to integrate environmental practices and thinking into its worship, education, facilities and outreach and completing a required number of actions and activities in each of the four areas. REV. JEN DUNFEE CARE MINISTRY


Several decades ago I read the line in Annie Dillard's *Holy the Firm*, "All day long I feel created" yet those six words remain my companions, often rising from within me as a prayer of adoration to the Creator of all things. Sometimes in a

moment like Annie's, simply eating breakfast, looking out the window and feeling a transcendent awe that overwhelms an otherwise ordinary moment. Often the words come to me when I am in the woods, in the woodpecker's persistent tapping or a mushroom in a color I have never seen before. To feel created among creation connects with Christian faith and practice: wonder at the majesty of the transcendent God who is also immanent, God-with-us, in the details; gratitude for the gifts of the earth; commitment to stewardship in caring for what God creates and loves; and practices of discipleship that prioritize earth care over self-comfort and convenience.

I am grateful to be ministering with a congregation that is part of the Earth Care Network and considers the connection between scripture, faith and creation-care in worship, book study, with our building and facilities, and Lenten practices. Our family appreciates the tips from the Earth Care Network as we adopt a Lenten practice each year related to environment stewardship and being more mindful consumers. These practices have included: saving our trash for two week periods and assessing our waste habits; (any more than two weeks proved rather difficult!) attempting a no-plastic packaging Lent; vegetarian Lent; and this year a practice we hope to continue year round – only eating meat from pick-up locations from local farms. None of this goes perfectly, case in point that the night before I write, hours after a meeting to plan the upcoming Earth Care Worship service, we bought a McDonald's dinner for our son who isn't feeling well. However non-perfectly we follow through, our family is privileged to have the economic and time bandwidth to eat local meat. As a privileged family we feel called to do so because we know that the extra expense and time is prohibitive for so many.

Once again the worship service closest to Earth Day, Sunday April 25th, will explore themes of creation-care in scripture, children's time, prayer and music. Be on the lookout for a family-event that weekend and a special movie discussion for the Earth Care Book Discussion. And be on the lookout for times over the next month that you feel created by the loving Creator of all things!

LEWINSVILLE MINI-FORUM: THE BIDEN IMMIGRATION PLAN

President Biden's first major legislative initiative after taking office was a proposal for immigration reform. We will analyze three aspects of it that may raise issues for thoughtful Christians.

UNDOCUMENTED INDIVIDUALS. The proposal provides a pathway to legal status and ultimately to citizenship for undocumented individuals, including but not limited to so-called dreamers. What should be the requirements for gaining such status? How should the United States discourage future illegal migration in the face of what some will consider a massive grant of amnesty?

BORDER CONTROLS. The proposal ends work on a physical border barrier (the wall) in favor of smarter use of technology and infrastructure. What are the implications of this approach? Roughly half the undocumented individuals in the United States today arrived legally but overstayed their visas. How should the United States deal with this problem?

FUTURE LEGAL IMMIGRATION. Currently the major sources of legal immigration include various forms of family reunification as well as refugees and those seeking asylum. In recent years there have been calls for changing to a system such as that used by Australia that emphasizes the value to the United States economy of people admitted. How should the question of who can come when not all can come be dealt with from a Christian perspective?

This three week course will devote one week to each of these broad questions (order not yet determined). As always we will be primarily interested in how our faith helps us to look at these demanding questions, none of which have obvious answers.

THE CHARACTER OF GOD/BIBLE PROJECT

Exodus 34:6-7: Then the Lord passed by in front of him and proclaimed, "The LORD, the LORD, a God compassionate and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in lovingkindness and truth; who keeps lovingkindness for thousands, who forgives iniquity, transgression and sin; yet He will by no means leave the guilty unpunished, visiting the iniquity of fathers on the children and on the grandchildren to the third and fourth generations."

Exodus 34:6-7 is the first description of God's attributes found in the Bible, and it's the most referenced passage in the Bible. Here we learn that all of God's actions are an expression of these attributes: compassion, grace, patience, loyal love, and faithfulness. Because of the Enormous Generosity of the Congregation of Lewinsville Presbyterian Church, the Deacons and the Mission and Service Ministry Group were able to distribute an additional \$45,000 to support mission activities. These activities included the following activities:

- **Children and Youth Service Project** A new service project where \$5,000 was evenly distributed to fifty children and youth of the congregation. The project provided an opportunity for the younger folks of LPC to see the needs around them and to actively share God's love and money from the surplus in a tangible way.
- **Thrive East of the River** In collaboration with Martha's Table and Bread for the City and others donations were made to Ward 8 families to address economic instability posed by COVID.
- **Washington Area Fuel Fund** The area fuel fund is administered through Washington Gas and the Salvation Army to help people in financial need to pay their fuel bills.
- **SHARE** Operating out of the McLean Baptist Church, SHARE of McLean is a food and clothing pantry offering food and meal donations, furniture, emergency financial aid, and school supplies to those in need in the McLean area.
- **Falls Church McLean Children's Center** The Children's Center provides early childhood programs and preschool programs to younger children, allowing their parents and family members to return to work. In addition to the learning programs, the Children's Center provides meal assistance and provides dental, vision, and hearing screening.
- **Second Story** Second Story provides long term housing, life skills training, and counseling for homeless youth and young mothers. Second Story operates drop-in centers for those who need more support outside their homes including victims of human trafficking, abuse, and gang activity.
- **Homestretch** Homestretch provides programs and resources to empower homeless parents with children to attain permanent housing and self-sufficiency.
- **United Orphanage and Academy** United Orphanage & Academy in Moi's Bridge (UOA), Kenya provides a home for 50 children and a school for more than 200 students from the orphanage and community in grades K-8th grade. In addition to housing, meals, clothing, medical care, and education for resident orphans, UOA strives to improve the educational opportunities for all of its students and financially assist orphans who attend vocational or higher education institutions.
- **Friends of The Lewinsville** Friends of The Lewinsville (FOL) is a non-profit providing financial support since 1982 to the Lewinsville Retirement Residence (LRR) for programs, activities and services to support residents' physical, mental and spiritual health.
