#### FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends at Lewinsville.

The festival of Christmas, towards which we are moving in the month of December, is a deep, profound, and thick announcement. Christmas is the announcement that *the newborn King has come*. That is to say, Christmas is a royal celebration. It is a celebration of the

kingdom of God, in which Jesus Christ is revealed as the true King. Christmas, then, joins up with the acclamations of Psalm 93, 95, 96, 97, 99, and others, which proclaim, 'The LORD is king!" Christmas joins up with the first words of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark, where he proclaims, "The kingdom of God is at hand!" (Mark 1:15).

This announcement of the arrival of Jesus and the establishment of his kingdom means that the *other kingdoms of the world*, kingdoms of violence and fear, no longer can claim our ultimate loyalty. They are, at best, penultimate. Wherever those kingdoms are organized in opposition to the will and the reign of God, we are invited to depart from them in some way. As we say at Easter, we no longer need to be afraid, of anything, or anyone, anymore, because Jesus is our King, and his merciful Kingdom has been established.

However, in the midst of all of these claims of Jesus' sovereignty and royal authority, we must not miss the deep and abiding vulnerability that marks Christmas. Jesus did not come as a dread warrior, slaying his enemies with a loaded weapon. Jesus came as a vulnerable child, whose parents fled from the slaughtering menace of King Herod, and the Holy Family became refugees in Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15). Just as the end of Jesus' life was marked by vulnerability and suffering, so was the beginning of his life.

The festival of Christmas is a celebration of Jesus' royal authority that is marked by enduring vulnerability. You and I are summoned to live our lives with a similar mix of humility and confidence, vulnerability and strength, honoring our weakness while receiving power from God's grace.

Where in your life do you experience great strength? Where in your life do you experience great weakness and vulnerability? How are those areas related to each other?

### YOUTH CHRISTMAS PARTY SUNDAY, DECEMBER 17 6:00-8:00 PM




This service will intertwine music with scripture, candlelight and reflection. Join us Wednesday December 20th at 7:30pm

#### REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT MINISTRY UPDATE

#### FINAL UPDATE ON THE H FAMILY

We are pleased to report that the H family twins were born on October 27. They are healthy, and mother Zarlasht is well but very tired! We have delivered three carloads of gifts for the babies from the congregation—cribs, car seats, stroller, clothing, diapers, baby bottles, toys. The family is very grateful for the generosity of our church.

The congregation has provided many tangible goods to the entire family. We have fully furnished their apartment, and we have provided a television set, a laptop computer, a sewing machine, clothes, toys, a portable clothes dryer, and an automobile. We have offered extensive assistance in many ways to help the family become integrated into the community.

A recent meeting was held with the Refugee Resettlement Team (RRT), the H family, and representatives from Lutheran Social Services (LSS) (the refugee resettlement agency that sponsors the family). At that meeting LSS reported that Lewinsville Presbyterian Church has provided more support to the H Family than any other church they have worked with in refugee resettlement.

At the end of our six-month initial commitment, we decided to help pay the family's apartment rent for six months, because the husband was not fully employed. The agreement we had with the family was that this support would continue if the husband found a full-time job. This was done in order to motivate Hamid to find full-time work which he has been reluctant to do. When it became evident after a month that he was not going to seek such employment, we decided to terminate our relationship with the family. This decision was made with the support of LSS. LSS will continue to support the family, and Hamid and Zarlasht


have extended family in the Northern Virginia area that can provide help.

The RRT has concluded that we have accomplished our goal of being good neighbors to this family. We have fulfilled our commitment and have gone above-and-beyond the expectations of our partnership with LSS. We are looking forward in the new year to assisting another refugee family and welcoming them into our community.

The RRT continues to be amazed at the generosity of this congregation. Thank you for the many, many ways you support this ministry.

## REV. JEN DUNFEE CARE MINISTRIES

Although *O Little Town of Bethlehem* is not one of my top favorite Christmas Carols, it includes one of

my all-time favorite Christmas lines in the second half of the first verse, "Yet in thy dark streets shineth the ever lasting light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight." The image of dark streets shining with everlasting light connects the past historical event – the bright light of Jesus and his star arriving in the night – with the present reality that Jesus still comes into our darkest street, or season, or moment, as a bright and everlasting light. Jesus was the promised messiah who came in glory fulfilling all hopes and comforting all fears, and he continues to come in glory to meet us in our current circumstance and complicated mix of hopes and fears each year.

Lewinsville Presbyterian Church recognizes this complicated mix, the possibility of dark streets, in its celebration of Advent and Christmas. One way is through the Longest Night service, here at Lewinsville at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, December 20th, where we worship the God who is always present, especially when we may feel significant sadness or grief, causing a gulf of distance from the surface happy presentation of Christmas we see around us in our culture.

Another is through our visiting Christmas Carol teams, who drive to visit people who might have had a recent loss, or be homebound or experiencing a medical challenge this season. If you are interested in joining a car/team for an afternoon of travel Christmas-Carol singing on December 10th, let me or John Nothaft know. If you have a suggestion for a person who might appreciate a Carol visit, we'd love the suggestion as well. #### EARTH CARE DURING THE HOLIDAYS

Family gatherings, fellowship and good cheer are treasured aspects of the holiday season but they are not always earth-friendly. With care, we can enjoy our traditions while being good stewards of God's creation. Here are some suggestions:

- Start each day with a short earth care oriented meditation. Presbyterians for Earth Care is offering an "Advent Daily Devotional" written by Presbyterian pastors and lay people. The daily reflections bring an earth care perspective to Bible passages selected from the Revised Common Lectionary, and point to actions we can take.
- ♦ Shop at Lewinsville's Fair Trade sale on December 10.

  Purchasing fair trade certified products helps reduce poverty, encourage environmentally friendly production methods and safeguard humane working conditions.
- ◆ Take advantage of Lewinsville's Alternative Gift Sale (Sundays during Advent). Many folks don't need, or want, more 'stuff' and a thoughtful donation to one of our mission partners can be the perfect solution.
- Give fewer gifts (draw names for a gift exchange in large extended families) and give quality gifts that will last a long time.
- Give 'experiences' instead of 'stuff', e.g., fun classes (cooking, exercise, pottery); event tickets (music, theater, sports, movies); memberships (parks, museums, gyms).
- Choose gifts from brands that prioritize sustainability and ethical practices.
- ◆ Choose sustainable stocking stuffers. See Memoirs and Earthhero for ideas.
- ♦ Buy from local providers and crafts people whenever possible.
- ♦ Use reusable gift bags and boxes; save wrapping paper/bows/ribbons in good condition for reuse.
- ♦ Use LED lights and light timers to save energy.
- ◆ Reuse decorations from past years, buy second-hand, or obtain through free exchange groups, such as Buy Nothing and Freecycle (a great way to dispose of unwanted items as well).
- Engage the family in making decorations from natural materials.
- Include more plant-based foods at holiday gatherings. Fruits, vegetables and grains offer healthy, delicious alternatives to meat, and are less impactful on the environment. Plan carefully for meals to avoid food waste, a major source of greenhouse gas emissions. If possible, compost unavoidable waste.

#### **NOVEMBER SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS:**

- 1. Pastor Scott reported to the Session the exciting news that Jackie Hager had been approved by National Capital Presbytery as a Young Adult Advisory Delegate to the 2024 General Assembly. Pastor Scott also reported that Madison Kloster had been approved by National Capital Presbytery as an alternate Ruling Elder Commissioner to the 2024 General Assembly.
- 2. Finance Committee Chair, Phil Cooke, reported that October revenue was strong for the month, and expenses for October equaled revenue. Phil is cautiously optimistic as the year end approaches.
- 3. Stewardship Committee Chair, elder Spencer Deese, reported that 141 pledges had been received to date, of which 93 were increases over last year and 9 were new pledges. The committee has begun contacting members of the congregation who have not yet pledged, reminding them to do so as soon as possible, in order to have the most realistic budget conversation at the December Session Meeting.
- **4.** Jim Maiwurm and Lori Gray made a presentation to Session about the Lewinsville Foundation; it's history, investment principles current funds, and plans for the future.
- **5.** Session received a report from the Personnel Committee that two search committees had been formed and had begun to meet one to fill the position of Director of Christian Education being vacated by Allison Lineberger in 2024, and one to fill a new position of Director of Communications.
