DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR & MATTHEW 25

As a Matthew 25 church, as we enter the month of January, it is not only a time to embrace the new year but also an opportunity to reflect on the profound impact of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his efforts in the pursuit of justice and equality. FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends at Lewinsville.

In Mark 1:21-28, Jesus goes into a synagogue in the town of Capernaum to teach. And the text says that "they were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes." What is remarkable about this verse is that the scribes were actually

persons endowed with meaningful authority. They held positions of esteem in the community.

But the text suggests that, when the scribes spoke or taught, they did not teach with genuine authority. This story is drawing a contrast between the inner authority with which Jesus teaches and the external authority with which the scribes taught.

We will sometimes talk about how it is possible to have all kinds of academic degrees, but not to have much "common sense." Having lots of intellectual information does not necessary mean that one has wisdom for living. It is possible for us to try to impress people with how much we know. But when we are eager to impress others, our efforts will always be delivered in a container of anxiety, about whether we will in fact be impressive.

Living from an inner authority is a very different matter. When one has had a genuine experience of God, one has experienced something that cannot be taken away. Others may question you about your experience, but they cannot take your experience away from you. When we speak from what we truly know, there will be a quiet confidence about us, that does not need to claim too much. We will not need to raise our voice to get our points across, because we will speak with the unshakable confidence of one who speaks from the truth of our own experience.

As we move into 2024, I would encourage you (and I'm going to encourage myself!!) to not try to claim too much for ourselves. Let us speak what we know, and then let us remain quiet. Let us share our viewpoints, and then let us listen to the viewpoints of others. Let us not try to "borrow authority" from someone else – whether from a book we've read, or a famous person we know - but to allow our own experience and our own truth speak for itself. Let us trust God's work in us, and allow that work to bear fruit in our speech and in our lives.

Let us remember Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. not just as a historical figure but as a guidepost for our own journey toward a more just and compassionate world. May his legacy inspire us to live out our faith boldly and to work tirelessly for the transformation of our communities.




TAIZÉ CONTEMPLATIVE WORSHIP SUNDAY, JANUARY 7, 7:00 P.M. **SANCTUARY**



On Sunday January 7, we will have a special experience for members of Lewinsville to contemplate Epiphany. Everyone is invited to walk the lighted labyrinth and discover their 2024 "Star Word." Epiphany, traditionally celebrated on January 6th, marks the visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus. They followed a star to find God's revelation made real on earth.

As you walk the illuminated labyrinth, its winding path can guide your thoughts towards the significance of Epiphany. The soft glow of the lights will create a tranquil atmosphere, allowing you to connect with the spiritual journey of the Magi and, in turn, your own journey of faith. At the heart of the labyrinth each person will receive a "Star Word" – a word to help guide and inspire your spiritual life throughout the coming year.

Walking a labyrinth is an ancient practice that combines movement and meditation. It provides an opportunity to slow down, to reflect, and to open our hearts to divine insights. The labyrinth, with its twists and turns, mirrors the twists and turns of life, and as we navigate it, we find ourselves in a metaphorical journey of faith.




FIRST MESSY CHURCH OF 2024 AND WE'RE GOING FISHING!

REFORMED INSTITUTE CONVOCATION



- The Falls Church McLean Children's Center staff used our facilities to host their annual end-of-year holiday celebration
- The Alternative Gifts campaign raised over \$15,000 to support many of our mission partners

In addition to the regular Monday nights, we will have special events at convenient times for groups in the church and hopefully some competition with other churches, those events will be announced separately.



The Deacon Fund continues to be robustly supported by the congregation. Nearly all donations are anonymous to me and the Deacons, as they are processed through the online giving button of the website. These funds support many people in the congregation and

community who face a range of short-term or emergency financial needs.

The Deacons keep a maximum of \$5,500 in the fund to respond to fluctuating draws each month. When the fund substantially exceeds \$5,500 (due to fewer needs in a given month) the surplus is transferred to the Mission and Service committee. The members of Mission and Service match those funds to short-term or emergency financial needs of community service partners, while the Deacon Fund supports the needs of individuals asking for assistance.

The pastors and deacons become aware of individual needs in a variety of ways: church members are aware of the fund and ask for assistance, the Pastors are aware of financial needs and suggest Deacon Fund support, community members connected to the congregation as visitors in worship or participants in programs ask for assistance, or people make "cold calls" to a variety of congregations.

In each situation, there is follow-up to understand the needs and the how the fund might be able to help. The Deacon Fund pays bills directly, for example to a leasing agency, hotel, or medical facility.

Thank you to everyone who supports the Deacon Fund, allowing the church to quickly support people in a wide range of challenge. The graphic highlights the amazing work your gifts made possible in 2023.

RESOLVE TO REDUCE YOUR ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

Keep earth care in mind as you make your New Year's resolutions. An internet search of "green New Year's resolutions" will yield many lists of actions you can take to

lessen your impact on the environment. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- Eat less meat (especially red meat) and dairy. Strategies for cutting back include "Meatless Mondays", "Vegan Before 6", meat on weekends only or at one meal/day.
- Reduce food waste in your home. Plan your meals and your shopping; buy only what you can use before it spoils, organize your storage to keep track of what you have, and donate any excess.
- Sign up for a <u>Green Power program</u> (draws from only renewable sources) whether you own your home or rent.
- Get an energy audit of your home or make your own assessment, and take actions to improve energy efficiency, such as adding insulation and weather stripping for doors and windows.
- When replacing appliances and HVAC invest in energy-efficient models. Go electric to reduce carbon emissions.
- Reduce your carbon footprint by driving less, using public transportation, or carpooling.
- Consider a hybrid or electric vehicle if you are buying a car.
- Repair and reuse items whenever possible to reduce new purchases.
- Reduce single-use plastic waste by using reusable shopping bags, water bottles, coffee cups, straws and cutlery. Take your own 'to -go' containers for restaurant meal leftovers.
- Buy less. Support brands that prioritize sustainability and fair labor practices.
- Plant a garden or support local agriculture by buying produce from farmers' markets.
- Plant native trees, shrubs and insects.
- Volunteer your time or donate to a charity that cares for the earth.
- Be mindful of water use, e.g., take shorter showers, install water-efficient faucets and appliances, and use water judiciously on the garden and lawn.

By making and keeping sustainable resolutions, you are contributing to a better world today and protecting our earth for future generations. Your actions will inspire your family and friends to follow your lead.



DECEMBER SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS:

- 1. Finance Committee Chair, Phil Cooke, reported that November revenue was down for the month and is also down year to date. Fortunately, expenses for November were also under budget. December is typically a strong month for contributions so Phil remains cautiously optimistic that the church year will end in a good place.
- 2. Phil walked Session through a first draft of the 2024 budget based on current pledged income and requested ministry group expenses. Elders were asked to work with their ministry groups and finance committee liaison to identify ways to close the projected gap. Based on those efforts, a second draft will be reviewed at the January Session meeting. A resolution of appreciation was approved for Phil's hard work so far.
- 3. Session approved a call to the congregation for the Annual Congregational Meeting to be held on Sunday, February 4, 2024 at 9:30am.
- 4. Session affirmed Lewinsville's commitment as an Earth Care Congregation and endorsed the application for recertification.
- 5. Session approved a recommendation from the Personnel Committee to change Jeanne Melone's title from Financial Manager to Human Resources and Finance Manager, based on the recommendations of the Staff Configuration Task Force.
