FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends at Lewinsville.

"We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19).

During this Lenten season at Lewinsville, we are reflecting together on the theme of "Hospitality and Service." Showing hospitality to others — strangers, friends, loved ones, neighbors, enemies — is one of

the core ways for us to practice our faith in Jesus Christ.

However, it can sometimes happen that hospitality becomes heavily weighed down with "should." We SHOULD show hospitality. We SHOULD be a welcoming congregation. We SHOULD reach out to new people.


Whenever the word "should" begins to show up a whole lot in our vocabulary, we have likely moved out of the kingdom of grace and into the kingdom of legalism.

What legalistic religion (i.e., "You SHOULD do these things in order to be faithful") always forgets is that we are always acting *in response to* Jesus' grace. We do not make the first move with hospitality. Any hospitality that we show is done out of the recognition that Jesus has already shown profound hospitality to us. We are responding to Jesus' gracious hospitality to us. "We love because he first loved us."


This is the same concept that is behind Jesus' statement that those who have been forgiven much love much, and those who think that they have little to be forgiven will almost certainly love little. Our love for others always flows out of the awareness that we have ourselves been loved, especially in the places where we didn't deserve to be loved, where we had not "earned" the love.

As we approach the cross of Jesus Christ, we become ever more aware of how Jesus has loved us *while we were still sinners*. As that knowledge sinks in - as we acknowledge and understand and accept the ways that we have been loved and shown hospitality – our hearts will break open, and we will naturally extend that love and hospitality to others, just as they are.

PALM SUNDAY FEATURING MUSIC OF THE BOULANGER SISTERS FOR STRINGS, ORGAN, AND CHOIR

This Palm Sunday we celebrate the music of Nadia and Lili Boulanger. The sisters were not only talented musicians and composers, but also broke gender barriers on their way to great musical achievements. Both sisters were among the first few women to enter the prestigious Prix de Rome competition, and in 1913 Lili became the first woman to earn the coveted Grand Prix. After Lili's untimely death at the age of 24, her sister continued to promote her music and worked to keep her legacy alive. Nadia went on to become one of the most influential musical pedagogues of her generation. Her pupils, the so-called "Boulangerie," included such luminariesto-be as Aaron Copland, Philip Glass and Quincy Jones. Palm Sunday's worship service will feature music for strings and choir by the Boulanger Sisters, their teacher, Gabriel Fauré, and their pupils, including Aaron Copland and David Conte.

SPECIAL COMMISSIONED PIECE FOR EASTER SUNDAY MARCH 31, 2024

Lewinsville's Music Fund has commissioned a Brass and Organ prelude composed by David Conte. This special Easter prelude is in memory of Helen Martin, a longtime friend, musician, and generous supporter of Lewinsville's Music Ministry and Music Fund.

Conte (b. 1955) is the composer of over one hundred and fifty works published by E.

C. Schirmer Music Company. He lived and worked with Aaron Copland while preparing a study of the composer's sketches, having received a Fulbright Fellowship for study with Copland's teacher Nadia Boulanger in Paris, where he was one of her last students. Conte received his DMA from Cornell University. He is Professor of Composition and Chair of the Composition Department at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He has received commissions from Chanticleer, the San



Francisco, Oakland, Stockton, and Dayton Symphonies, the Atlantic Classical Orchestra; and from the American Guild of Organists. In 2007 he received the Raymond Brock commission from the American Choral Directors Association, one of the nation's highest honors in choral music. Conte is a significant LGBTQ+ composer and leading compositional voice in America.





John makes this clear on how he wants his readers to see Jesus in these words near the end of his gospel, "But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." John seeks to provide his unique perspective on Jesus

through the use of memorable metaphors. Join Rev. Dan Thomas as together we explore such rich and illuminating metaphors as tabernacle, living water, bread of life, resurrection and the life, and Passover offering and seek to discover how these can enrich our view and understanding of Jesus during this Lenten season.

One of the key metaphors John uses in his gospel to enable his readers to see Jesus more clearly is "The Lamb of God". John introduces this metaphor two times in the first chapter of his gospel; as Jesus approaches John the Baptist to be baptized; and later for John the Baptist to identify Jesus to two of John's disciples. But this metaphor reaches its apex during Holy Week and in particular with Jesus' passion on Good Friday. How can the meaning and significance of the Jewish festival of Passover lead us to a heightened appreciation and understanding of Jesus' true identity and us to see and Believe in Jesus with greater conviction? Come and begin your Holy Week observance with a deeper dive into these questions and others.

A priority is placed on relational service ministry opportunities but they also serve behind the scenes through manual labor. Most likely we will experience some of both in Rutland.



REV. JEN DUNFEE CARE MINISTRIES

A 2020 report from AARP estimates there are 41 million Americans providing unpaid care to an adult over age 50. The report included children caring for parents, a person caring for a spouse or partner (either sharing the same home or not) and neighbors and friends providing care. A similar Blue Cross/Blue Shield study noted an increased stress level in 57% of respondents, including anxiety, financial strain, and time limitations that impact the caregiver's physical

health. Since the average age of a caregiver is 50, many are also in the sandwich generation, caring for children at home and older adults at the same time.

Many people at Lewinsville Presbyterian identify as caregivers of older adults, and from stories I have heard, would resonate with the mix of challenges above and blessings described below that come with the role. The writer Kathleen Norris wrote about caring for her parents in a Christian Century article, "caregiving chose me, and through it I discovered capacities within myself I had no idea were there. Success is simply being there, enjoying another's company and being willing to do whatever job is necessary." (Christian Century, 5/5/21) Joyce Ann Meyer describes the mutual gifts of caregiving that follow a biblical pattern of call, "The call of individuals and communities overlaps so that the circumstances of one are addressed in the vocation of the other....an ecological understanding of vocation leaves room for the possibility that the needs of some parts of the community to receive care may activate giving on the part of others called to offer care." (Christian Century, 7/5/2017)

Caregiving in any relationship (spouse, partner, parent, child, friend, neighbor) brings a mix of stressors and opportunities for blessing. Christian faith can help support caregiving with a theological understanding of mutuality, service and vocation. Prayer, personal and share with others, can remind caregivers of a strength beyond the moment in a difficult day, and that God is always with the caregiver and person receiving care. Opportunities to share stressors together, in small groups, fellowship events, age and stage groups like those for youth parents, older adults, people in their 50s/60s can lighten the load. An upcoming opportunity for the particularly difficult challenge of caring for people with memory loss is a CE course on Navigating Dementia with Compassion and Care on May 5, 12 and 19th. There will be presentations from Melissa Long at Memory Care Center, theologian Dorothy Lithicum sharing advice for caregivers, and a panel of church members. If you have ideas for the series or would like to participate in the panel, please reach out. I end this article with a prayer for all caregivers, that they may be strengthened by the love of Christ, showered with the gifts of the Spirit, and encouraged by God who is always with them.

Lewinsville is both an <u>Earth Care Congregation</u> and a <u>Matthew 25</u> congregation. We tend to view these as separate commitments, when in fact, they are closely intertwined. Environmental degradation often impacts poor and vulnerable populations first and most acutely.

In a resolution titled "Investing in a Green Future: A Vision for a Renewed Creation" the 2022 PC(USA) General Assembly directed the Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA) to "make restoring Creation (including environmental justice, racial justice and economic justice) a key priority in its Matthew 25 programming and in its advocacy". In so doing, PMA identified climate change as a persistent and serious threat to the well being of communities thrust to the margins and connected it to Matthew 25 program's primary focal points of eradicating structural racism, eliminating systemic poverty, and building congregational vitality.

Lewinsville's Earth Care Book Group is hosting a discussion via Zoom of Before the Streetlights Come On by Heather McTeer Toney on Wednesday, March 6, 7:30 - 8:30 pm. to explore the overlapping concerns of Earth Care and Matthew 25 with respect to climate change. Dr. McTeer Toney shares real-life stories drawn from her background in politics, community advocacy and leadership in environmental justice that illustrate the many ways that Black Americans are disproportionately impacted by climate change. She writes "when it comes to climate and environmental issues, humanity is in the same storm, but we are not in the same boat. Some of us are sailing along in yachts or manning aircraft carriers while others are bobbing along in rafts and rowboats. The impact of the storm hits us differently".

All are invited to join the discussion. Familiarity with the book is helpful, but not required. (Zoom link provided in the Feb. 29 Lewinsville Update).

FEBRUARY SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS:

- 1. At a special meeting of Session held on February 8, 2024, Session approved the Personnel Committee's request to hire Alexandria (Alex) Johnson as a full-time Director of Communications effective March 4, 2024. At that same meeting, Session elected Doug Smith as Clerk of Session for a one-year term beginning May 1, 2024.
- 2. At the regular meeting of Session held on February 20, 2024, Finance Committee Chair, Phil Cooke, reported that January 2024 income was strong and more than budgeted and expenses for January were under budget; a good start to the year.
- 3. At that same meeting, Session received a report from elder elect Alan Kohler about the new Lewinsville Emergency Action Preparedness (LEAP) Team. The main objective of this new group is to "make Lewinsville Presbyterian Church safer for everyone". The initial planning process includes understanding current safety and security measures, prioritizing the focus, then communicating with the congregation
- 4. Additionally, Session received a report from Jerry Kohlenberger, finance committee liaison to the Worship Ministry Group, on the Music Fund and approved two Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) to provide support for the Music Ministry, improved transparency for Session on sources and uses of the Fund, and clear roles and limits of authority.
- 5. Session received a report from the Youth Council with an update on current activities.
- Finally, Session approved a request from the Director of Christian Education Search Committee to post the open position on the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s Church Leadership Connection platform to attract ordained candidates.
