EARTH CARE SUNDAY April 21, 2024

On Sunday, April 21, Lewinsville will mark our commemoration of Earth Day with Earth Care Sunday. We will once again be joining with Interfaith Power and Light (IPL), a mission partner of Lewinsville, and with other churches, synagogues, and mosques to lift up creation and earth care in our worship services. We do this as a way of affirming that care for the earth is a religious commitment and is part of our responsibility and calling to be stewards of God's good gifts. It also gives us an opportunity to reflect on the ways that we fall short of God's call to care for the earth with love.

This year's Earth Care Worship Service is part of our Easter sermon series, "Lament as an Easter Act of Hope." This series holds up the biblical practice of lament as a practice in which the church engages. Because of our convictions about the power of God, shown most clearly in raising Jesus from the dead, we know that God can make a way where there is no way. God is in the business of tearing things down, but also of building things up (Jeremiah 1:1-10). God brings things to an end, and God does a new thing, sometimes right under our noses. On Earth Care Sunday, we bring to the Lord our varied concerns about the well-being of the earth, concerns for animals, water, air, trees, soil, and human flourishing. We may lament our own sinfulness that has participated in the degradation, and we ask God to create a new heart within us, so that we will cherish the earth rather than living in ways that harm the earth.

During the last three weeks of April, we will have a 3-week sermon series on the biblical practice of lament. Lament is the practice of sharing our grief, our hurt, our complaints with God, in the confidence and hope that God will hear us and that our prayers will make a difference, urging God to bring about a change in our circumstances. FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends at Lewinsville,

"Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again."

These Easter words, which have formed the core of the Christian liturgy for many hundreds of years, point to the basic convictions of our faith.

Christ has died. These words point to everything from the forgiveness of our sins, to the non-violent lifestyle of Jesus, to the modeling of an ongoing practice of *surrender*, as opposed to *defensiveness*, as the way for us to live our lives.

Christ is risen. These words point to the conviction that the powers of death cannot stop God, which is why the Christian faith is such a threat to the empires of the world, who want to control reality. The worst that the empires of the world can threaten us with is death: "If you do such-and-such, or if you refuse to go along with such-and-such, we will have you killed." These death threats seek to intimidate people into compliance and passivity and letting the empire have its way. But the church stands up in the face of the powers of death and says, "We will follow Jesus, even if it costs us our lives." Death and fear and evil and sin are shown to be weaker than they would like us to believe.

Christ will come again. These words point to the promised reconciliation of all things, the promised consummation of all things, the promised judgment of all things, the promised setting-right of all things. When the New Testament concludes by praying, "Amen. Come, Lord Jesus" (Revelation 22:20), it concludes by laying claim to the hope that all things will be restored.

Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again. These words show us the way to love, the way to faith, and the way to hope. Let us hold fast to them, as we move through these coming days!!

Of the 150 psalms in the Bible, more than 1/3 of them are psalms of lament, so that our prayers of grief, hurt, and complaint are fully intended to be part of the life of faith. They are a way of saying that the promises of God – promises of well-being, of shalom, of justice, of wholeness – have not yet been realized. We are urging God to make good on God's promises. The church has too often avoided lament, perhaps out of a sense that it is somehow inappropriate to let God know we're unhappy. "Everything is just fine!" we may feel like we ought to say to God. Moreover, some may think that Easter is a strange season in which to practice lament, because it can feel like it cuts against the grain of the joy of the resurrection.

However, it is precisely because of our convictions about the resurrection that we can find the confidence to take our concerns and our hurts to God

in prayer. "Do for us what you have done by raising Jesus," we pray to God. We do this in our individual lives, with our individual concerns; we can give voice to our concerns about the well-being of the earth, as the waters and the air and the soil degrade; and we may give voice to our concerns about public pain, as the fabric of our society frays, as so many live in deep poverty, and as hostility and violence claim so many lives.


We will join with our biblical ancestors in taking our concerns directly to God, praying our way through our hurt, and drawing closer to God in the process.

RELIGION AND STATECRAFT: A FAITH AND PUBLIC POLICY DISCUSSIONLED BY LINTON BROOKSAPRIL 7-289:30-10:30 A.M.ROOM 102A

The Washington area is awash in foreign policy experts and deeply thoughtful religious scholars. Yet within government these two communities never meet. In particular the Department of State is a perfect example of Jefferson's argument that there should be an impenetrable wall between religion and government. At first this seems perfectly logical for a country that values separation of church and state. But it has serious consequences in dealing with the rest of the world. In an increasingly important number of countries, religion and politics have become fused. Examples include Modi's India, being transformed into a Hindu state, many Muslim majority nations, important U.S. allies like Turkey, and many African and South American states where religion still plays a major role in policy. The Obama administration sought to deal with this by establishing a position reporting to the Secretary to advise on religious issues. That position did not survive the administration. The only incumbent has written a book called Chasing the Devil at Foggy Bottom. Drawing in part on this book, which participants need neither purchase nor read, this course will review our history of taking religion into account in statecraft in order to wrestle with the question of what the U.S. position on this issue should be.

Scripture and poetry go together for me, and I am eager to share some "pairings." By focusing on "nature," can we find a sense of wonder, even as we may experience a sense of grief and loss? 
REV. JEN DUNFEE CARE MINISTRIES

Dr. Rita Nakashima Brock, who serves as the Senior Vice President for Moral

Injury Programs at Volunteers for America, was the 2013 scholar-in-residence at New York Avenue. She encourages Christian find a theology that allows for a deep love of the earth. In a 2021 Christian Century article, Brock describes the connection between our belief and our ability to act with hope: "Christians have choices. If what we believe about God is at the expense of the rest of humanity or the earth, it is too small, fearful and miserly to make room for much love to enable us to build a future together."

The Earth Care Network at Lewinsville Presbyterian suggests ways for us to build a future together, through acts of individual and church-wide service and through study, devotion and prayer. Regular newsletter articles offer the congregation timely tips for seasonal creation care and more sustainable use of resources. And Lewinsville continues to connect what we believe about God to love of the earth in bi-annual worship services: a fall service focused on the changing climate and a spring service close to Earth Day.

This year, the Earth Care service will be on April 21st with a theme of lament and hope. In scripture, children's time, prayer and music, we will consider before God who we can share our concerns, confess our missteps, and guided by scripture, find hope for enough love to move hearts and hands to widen our individual and communal practices and voice for care of the earth.





APRIL IS EARTH MONTH

Earth Day, celebrated annually on April 22, was established in the United States in 1970 to raise awareness about environmental issues and promote sustainable practices. It has since grown into a global observance with participation from over 190 countries. As environmental issues have become more critical, Earth Day has evolved into Earth Month, with events occurring throughout April. It is a time for educating ourselves and others about environmental challenges we face, such as pollution (including an explosion in plastic pollution), climate change, deforestation, and loss of biodiversity. Raising awareness is an important step in inspiring people to take action towards restoring balance of all life forms on our planet for now and for future generations.

Various faith traditions have embraced the Earth Day movement. For Christians, Earth Month is a great time to discern our response to the call to be caretakers of God's creation. Many congregations, including Lewinsville, hold a creation-focused worship service near the time of Earth Day to praise God for the beauty and diversity of all that God has created, and consider how we can be better stewards of what has been entrusted to us.

The theme for Earth Day 2024 is "Plastic vs Planet". It is focused on reducing plastic production by 60% by 2040. Read about it here. The Presbyterian Church (USA) is offering Christian education materials titled *Plastic Jesus-Real Faith in a Synthetic World*, "designed to help congregations think more deeply about the ways that plastics impact our lives and God's creation" and "equip people of faith to take actions to address this epidemic in faithful and practical ways". Both links include actions individuals can take during Earth Month and beyond to reduce their plastic consumption.

Other popular ways to participate in Earth Month include: planting trees, joining watershed clean-up events, removing invasive plants from our parks and yards, lowering your carbon footprint, and attending local Earth Day events such as this one in McLean.



The Lewinsville Emergency Action
